War Memories across Canada Conversation Kit:

Where the Decisions were Made Laurier House National Historic Site Ottawa, Ontario



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William Lyon Mackenzie King was Canada's longestserving Prime Minister. He led Canada for a total of twenty-one years over three terms: 1921-26, 1926-30 and 1935-48. King conducted most of his parliamentary work from his library on the third floor of his home. Today, visitors can tour the library exactly as it was during King's lifetime, and discover clues about the man who led Canada through the aftermath of the First World War, the Great Depression, and the Second World War.

Discussion Questions:

What attributes do you think make for a good leader during a time of crisis? What external factors do you think influence the leaders decisions?

What were King's strengths and weaknesses as a war-time leader?

What were the major decisions he faced, and how successful was he in mastering these decisions?

What kinds of decisions rest a Prime Minister versus Canadian military command during war-time? Can you derive any links to Canada's Prime Minister today; in other words what types of mandates are vital to his role in todays society?

Activities:

Research King's War Cabinet. Who were they and what were their strengths? Stage a mock meeting of the War Cabinet. What are the most pressing issues? What factors need to be taken into consideration?

Hold a debate to present both sides in the Conscription Crisis of 1944. English Canada was generally pro-conscription, while the majority of French Canadians opposed the idea. What are the main issues presented by both sides?

Visit the Mackenzie King library at Laurier House National Historic Site in Ottawa, Ontario. Examine the room carefully for clues about the man who once made important political decisions there. What books sit on his shelves? How is the room arranged? What about the lighting, mood and the views from his windows? How does the room help us to understand William Lyon Mackenzie King?
